Publications help Local Record Centres (LRCs) to promote their services

The NBN Trust and the Local Record Centres in North West England completed a project in 2011 to raise awareness of the services provided by LRCs and of the need to incorporate biodiversity data into spatial planning and land management decisions at a local and regional level.

One of the outcomes of this project was an interactive regional information document aimed at biodiversity data users in the public sector. It explains the relevant environmental legislation and showcases LRC services using real data search outputs based on the professional standards defined under the ALERC accreditation system.

The document also demonstrates the wider social and economic benefits provided by Local Record Centres. Case studies illustrate how LRC services have helped to enhance the local environment by attracting funding, improving decision making and engaging the public in recording and conserving wildlife. These examples are brought to life by quotes from local people who have benefited from LRC services, from consultants and planners to conservation groups and school children.

Local Record Centres' capacity to engage and support local volunteers enables them to deliver cost-effective data services to Local Authorities and public bodies while helping to achieve Big Society objectives. This valuable mechanism for mobilising high quality data can only be maintained if it is supported by all the users who rely on it, so it is hoped that the document will help LRCs to secure this support from local partner organisations.
