The Juncaceae: Rushes and Woodrushes

Where: The Gateway, Chester Street, Shrewsbury **When**: Wednesday 31st August 2016, 10.00am – 4.00pm **How much**: £45.00

Grasses, Sedges and Rushes make up almost a third of the British Flora; yet many botanists and ecologists shun them as to difficult to identify in part due to their small flowering and fruiting parts that can look quite similar.

Rushes belong to the family *Juncaceae* and are excellent ecological indicators. This makes it important to identify them to species, especially as many of them are rare or scarce and several species form important community constants in the National Vegetation Classification.

Following an introduction to Grasses, Sedges and Rushes and how to separate them we will concentrate on the key characters that define members of the *Juncaceae*.

This one day workshop will provide an introduction to this family and we will look at and identify a wide range of fresh and preserved material. In addition to a range of common rushes, we will also look at some of the less common species which are also good habitat indicators. Please feel free to bring any 'mystery specimens' you may have.

At the end of the session, you should be familiar with the main features of Rush vegetative parts and flowers and the diagnostic features that separate out the common species. You will also have an opportunity to key out some less common specimens.

Useful items to bring are a 10x handlens and identification guides such as the New Flora of the British Isles (2nd or 3rd edition), by Clive Stace.

Tutor: Mark Duffell runs *Arvensis Ecology*, splitting his time between conducting botanical surveys and teaching botanical identification and survey techniques.
