

# Notes from SBIF Inaugural Workshop, Battleby, 25 May 2012

# Key issues identified by workshops:

Data collection (Facilitator: Craig Macadam)

- Taxonomic expertise
- Recruitment/retention of volunteers; inclusivity
- Localism
- Resourcing: status quo not acceptable or sustainable

# **Data management** (Facilitator: Alexa Tweddle)

(NB: primarily considered species data)

- Findings largely echoed those of SurveyMonkey questionnaire:
- Resourcing; short-termism
- Data management software & compatibility
- Data quality: lack of local experts; lack of clear mechanisms for verification
- · Fragmented approaches & lack of consistent standards/formats

#### Data sharing (Facilitator: Paula Lightfoot)

- **SBIF website** (role for SE web?): case studies & statistics to demonstrate the value of sharing biodiversity data; explain acronyms; explain data-sharing pathways; host online recording portal (iRecord); Metadata discovery portal to prioritise digitisation; scheme similar to <u>Herbaria@home</u> for mobilising legacy data; links to tools and standards about data sharing to avoid 'reinventing the wheel'.
- **Gaps in data sharing**: target academia; target consultancies. Scope for Scottish Government to enforce data sharing by developers incorporate requirement into legislation?
- **Resourcing**: SNH should share its own data via iRecord; Scottish Government should fund development of verification rules for NBN Record Cleaner and iRecord (Defra has spent £100 K); Continuity of staffing in the organisations that support biological recording by volunteers is vital.

Data use (Facilitator: Malcolm Muir)

- Target uses & users of data in key policy areas: agri-environment sector; marine & fisheries; development planning.
- Good quality habitat information (spatial & qualitative)
- Converting data into information

# Some points from discussion:

Marine Spatial Planning will become increasingly important; Shetland already has such a plan.

Useful to formally define user group needs.

Most recorders are also data users.

Need to prioritise policy v. tactical uses of data & biodiversity indicators to assess effects of policies.

Many local authorities do not use biodiversity data, despite requirement of Biodiversity Duty.

The Scottish Biodiversity Strategy is being refreshed and a public consultation will take place over the summer.

Planning policy (development planning) is a very important use of data.

# **Process & existing initiatives**

Difference between SBIF & BRISC: SBIF has Scottish Government backing; BRISC raised issues, but cannot provide coordinated approach.

NBN has strong focus on sharing & use of data, with much experience of data protection & confidentiality.

Presentation by Janet Imlach had highlighted structural differences between Wales & Scotland: in Wales priority is given to role of all-Wales LRC network, while in Scotland NBN & iRecord are more important, and LRC coverage is patchy.

NBN is the only national player, but scope for a series of regional recording hubs covering Scotland, instead of LRCs?

iRecord is a tool that does not replace LRCs or recording schemes.

UKBRAG has developed portal for taxonomic guidance, led by Natural History Museum. Role for National Museums Scotland to provide voucher specimen service, working in conjunction with NHM and Royal Botanic Gardens at Edinburgh & Kew?

SBIF should not reinvent wheels

SBIF should deter reinventions of wheels & duplication of effort by others.

Recording community is ageing – needs rejuvenation & encouragement. New technologies can help do this.

# Establishment of a Forum

There was overwhelming majority agreement that a Scottish Biodiversity Information Forum should be formed.

Several other potential representatives were also suggested; however Steering Group members are representing *sectors* rather than their individual organisations. All members of the data community will have a role to play in SBIF.

The Steering Group should hold its first meeting by late July – SNH offered to organise this. The Steering Group should elect a Chair, and discuss an appropriate period for members to serve. The Steering Group should arrive at a tender process to invite bids for the role of SBIF Coordinator; any members whose organisations intend to tender will need to declare an interest and absent themselves from the relevant discussion. The Steering Group should discuss the appropriate geographical scale (marine coverage), informed by MASTS/MEDIN, etc.)

There is a danger of SBIF taking on too much (as seems to have happened in Wales); the Steering Group may initially prioritise a limited number of achievable targets.

The Steering Group should produce updates for distribution to SBIF members and other interested parties. There should be a meeting of the Forum in ~1 year to review progress.
