








My family farm is in Cambridgeshire






Fields are scanned and measured with GPS so we can target inputs to output.

Species that have undergone a 25 – 49% decline in breeding population or range in the UK during the last 25 years or have unfavourable conservation status in Europe All other species hold green status and are of lower conservation concern. 





Left is before ELS & HLS stewardship scheme Right is with small areas taken out of crop production





- Of particular note was Aquarius Paludum (pond skater). They only had 1 other record for this species in Cambridgeshire and the NBN Atlas has only 241 records







Why a Nature Friendly Farming Network?

- Independent market research with a wide range of farmers indicated that there would be a good level of support for this kind of approach
- It could be highly effective in securing positive changes in policy, including by how farming is supported by the public
- If we do nothing we risk failing to secure political traction for positive policy change and a shift in farming 'norms' towards a more sustainable outlook
- Together we can achieve more and learn from each other



The landscape in the UK is shaped by farming.

Yet not all change in recent times has been desirable, soils have been depleted, water courses degraded and nature has struggled to cope with the pace of change. We have seen declines in over 600 farmland species over the last 50 years.

However, many farms are bucking this trend, soils are being restored and nature is thriving and if more follow this lead we can reverse these declines. With over 70% of the UK being farmland, we need to act now to deliver for wildlife at a landscape scale.




- Our network will engender a strong community which will provide a strong voice for sustainable nature friendly farming
