

### The Automated Data (Layer) Harvester - Adding scalability to the NBN system

EPCC and NBN (along with Scottish Natural Heritage and SEPA as additional stakeholders), have been working on a project, to provide an Automated Data (Layer) Harvester for the NBN Atlas Scotland. This software checks for changes in a provider's layer by using the Scottish Spatial Data Infrastructure portal; this automatically pulls the data layer into the NBN Atlas and uploads it, ready for an administrator to perform intersections with species data.

This talk will present our work to date, and also talk about how we wish to expand it in the future, to allow the NBN Atlas to grow with the addition of predative data analytics. This project was funded by the University of Edinburgh's Data Engineering Programme at EPCC.
